



Book Study



The Pocket: A Hidden History of Women's Lives, 1660—1900

by Barbara Burman & Ariane Fennetaux

(Yale University Press, New Haven and London) ISBN 978-0-300-253740 PB

In August, I brought in a book, *The Pocket: A Hidden History of Women's Lives* written by Barbara Burman and Ariane Fennetaux. (For more information, please refer to the book review that Vicki did in the Sept/Oct newsletter.)

The book is a historical presentation about the piece of clothing that women wore underneath their street clothes to hold personal items. I inquired if anyone would like to gather for a book study. We will start after the first of the year and do it via zoom. It might even be fun to come up with our own versions of "the pocket".

November Project

Paint ~ Stitch ~ Bead

In October we did part one of this project and painted the fabric. A stencil was cut and put on the fabric. We used Shiva Paintstiks to paint the design. Since Shiva Paintstiks are oil based, we let the paint dry for at least 24 hours and then heat set it with a dry hot iron. It looked like everyone had fun.

At the November meeting, you will stitch and bead the design while learning some surface embroidery stitches and how to add some bling with beads. Please bring embroidery needles, threads, beads, scissors, your painted project, handout, hoop/stretcher bars (optional). The colors of threads and beads will depend on the color of your fabric and design. If you have any questions let Tracy know.

Wisconsin State Day with Donnelly

he Green Bay Area EGA Chapter hosted Wisconsin State Day on September 27-28. Dawn Donnelly was our guest teacher. The project we did was Snow Drifted Pathways using homemade paper, thread and canvas creating a



beautiful mixed media project.

members from

There were also two non-EGA members who attended and enjoyed the workshop; they are thinking about becoming members.

The handmade paper elements for the piece were created on the morning of the first day. Some of the paper needed to be

wet to properly shape it for drying. The rest of the workshop was spent stitching the paper to our

pieces and learning new stitches many of us had never used; we filled in other areas with other new stitches.

The project is a combination of canvas stitches, surface freeform embroidery stitches, and couching the paper and stitching through the paper to attach it to the canvas. The handmade paper was provided in our kits but we also learned the process for creating it for future projects.

Everyone had a great time and learned so much. We would highly recommend this workshop to any group wanting to explore something a little different but with enough familiar stitches to make it interesting and fun.

Dawn presented her process of designing the Snow Drifted Pathways piece at our regular Thursday night guild meeting and how she explored the process of putting paper and embroidery together.

You'll see our members pieces as they are finished.

Embroidery at the Antique Pattern Library

ast issue I wrote about embroidery at the Art Institute of Chicago. This month, Mary Corbet shared some links for antique resources, and I thought you might enjoy poking around in this one. https://www.antiquepatternlibrary.org/

Antique Pattern Library is a free site that provides access to 35 pattern collections on the following topics: Battenberg Lace, Beading, BerlinWork, Bobbin Lace Bookbinding, Calligraphy, Carpentry, Crochet, Cross-stitch, Cutwork, Drawing, Dressmaking, Embroidered net, Embroidery, Filet, Filet crochet, Flower Arranging, Glass, Hardanger, Irish crochet, Knitting, Knotting, Lace, Macrame, Paper, Point Lace, Quilting, Ribbonwork, Sewing, Tatting, Tulle embroidery, Various, Waxwork, Woodworking, and Workbasket Magazine.

They are looking for volunteers and donations - both literary and financial. I clicked on *Workbasket Magazine*, because I used to get that publication, and they have it from October 1935 (the first issue) scanned and ready for you to download. From December 1947 most of the issues are there but say either "TO EDIT" or starting in 1952 say 'TO SCAN". The issues continue through 1995 with only a few edited and scanned. At 1996 it says "Entire year wanted."

Any of the issues that are scanned and edited appear as tiny thumbnails, but click on a page and it jumps up to a full-page size. You can click from page to page or go to their Collections page and "shop" by alphabet. Unfortunately, the publications are filed by author, rather than technique, so clicking on H does not take you to Hardanger. It takes you to anyone who wrote patterns with a last name that starts with H.

UFO's Those Pesky Un-Finished Objects

e all have them - projects we started enthusiastically and then hit the wall- head on BAM, BANG, can't do it - back of the closet it goes - never to be heard from again.

Sometimes there is a big expense tied up in these projects and salvaging them is prudent, if not downright required. On the other hand, sometimes they are better left unfinished - I know at least one of mine will never see the light of day again.

That said - a few years ago Karen Domoracki started the UFO project as incentive for guild members to finish some of the works they had set aside. If you are new to the guild, you might enjoy checking this out. Here's how it works.

In September, Karen collects digital photos of UFOs from members who wish to participate. (Just photograph your unfinished object and email it to

karendomoracki@gmail.com.)

Put UFO in the subject line so she doesn't lose it on her computer. Then you have all of the Winter months to work on it and finish it, at which time you will take another picture of it and send it to karendomoracki@gmail.com like you did the first. In May there will be a UFO Reveal of all of the projects that got finished. The challenge is on. Go for it!
