Original designs, personal expression and excellence of work are promoted through annual jurying, online lectures, retreats and workshops led by professional fiber artists. Members are encouraged to enter local and national art shows to expose others to the art of embroidery. Fiber Forum exhibits annually at the National Seminar in the Education Exhibit. To be a part of EGA's Fiber Forum, you must go through a jurying process and submit your original artwork for review. You can review the jurying process here.

The good news is you can participate in Fiber Forum as a "friend". The Fiber Forum Friends group is open to any interested EGA member for a donation of \$10, due on May 31 of each year. The following are the benefits of "friendship".

- · Friends receive the quarterly e-newsletter that publishes Fiber Forum news and activities
- · Friends can attend all FF meetings and lectures, most of which are online.
- Educational programs for Friends are offered yearly to inspire confidence to create original work and to learn the ins and outs of the annual Jurying.
- · Friends may enroll for retreat and workshop spaces not filled by FF members.

In 2021 I joined Fiber Forum as a friend. In 2022, I took the leap and prepared my application with two pieces for submission in 2023. You only need one piece to meet the jurying requirements, so I thought I would be safe submitting two. Fiber Forum has a wonderful mentoring program that helped me revise my artist statements. ## Embroidery at Chicago's Art Institute

Who knew? Like most of the museum sites I have been exploring, if you click on an image in their collection, a description and background information tell you all about what you are seeing. This link, <a href="https://www.artic.edu/collection?">https://www.artic.edu/collection?</a>

<u>classification\_ids=embroidery&page=3</u>, takes you to the Chicago Art Institute's embroidery collection. These amazing works of art are just 4 hours south. We should go sometime.

The oldest thing I found was made in 1701, a French waist coat panel with embroidery. It's fun to look at the collection because it is so close to us, but the bottom line is that any museum you put in a search engine will produce examples of embroidery to explore, study, and read about. Don't forget to search around in Textiles. There are 1,000s of examples in Textiles, and most of them include embroidery of some kind.



### **Internet Archive**

#### archive.org/about

Last month I suggested several websites that might be of interest to stitchers. This issue I would like to suggest one site with literally millions of web pages, books, sets, images, etc. It is called the Internet Archive and it is a 501(c) (3) non-profit digital library on the web. You can establish a free account and go in and search, in our case, stitching information, until you are blue in the face. They claim to have:

- 835 billion web pages
- 44 million books and texts
- 15 million audio recordings (including 255,000 live concerts)
- 10.6 million videos (including 2.6 million Television News programs)
- 4.8 million images
- 1 million software programs

Just type in <a href="https://archive.org">https://archive.org</a> and explore. Type "embroidery" in the Search line and check out the left side of the screen. Or type in Hardanger, or needlepoint, or sampler. Just go on a treasure hunt.

The left side of the screen shows options for your individual interests. Each heading has a few options followed by the word "More..." Click on "More" to discover 1,000s of options you can make. The last topic on the left side of the screen is Language. Be sure to check English. In my not-so-humble opinion, Language should have been the first topic to choose.

Each of the books you find there has been scanned so you can page through a book from 1 to 600 if you want. I love this site because I can get to out-of-print books here. Enjoy!

# October & November Project Paint ~ Stitch ~ Bead

Karen Matze and Tracy Reeb will lead a fun project where you stitch and bead a design that you have chosen and painted. You will paint a design with **Shiva Paint Sticks** on batik fabric that will have been previously chosen at the August or September meetings. Then at the October meeting you will paint the design and take it home to dry for 24 hours and then set it with a hot iron.

At the November meeting, you will stitch and bead the design while learning some surface embroidery stitches and how to add some bling with beads. It will be fun and exciting. The cost is \$2.00 for the kit. Signup will be at the guild meetings. If you would like to participate but can't make the meetings before October, you can fill out the form below and choose your design, write what color fabric you would like and mail the form to Tracy Reeb. We'll make

sure everything is ready for you in October. Most of the supplies are included in the kit.

Please bring a color wheel (if you have one) to the October meeting We are using paint sticks. They don't spill and aren't too messy, but you might want to protect your clothes or wear something you would be OK getting a stain on if it happens.

For the November meeting please bring embroidery needles, threads, beads, scissors, painted project, handout, hoop/stretcher bars (optional), muslin. The colors of threads and beads will depend on the color of your fabric and design. We are going to show you some stitches you might not have used in the past and some we're sure you know and how to add beads to the stitches. For this project, the stitching is done first and then the beads are added. Samples will be at the guild meetings. If you have any questions, contact Karen or Tracy.

### Summer's End Exploring Silk Ribbon

Summer's End heralds one of the last flowers of summer, the sunflower. Join me as we stitch thissparkling design while learning the basics of silk ribbon embroidery and other canvas



techniques. By using a variety of threads and silk ribbons in various widths, dimension and texture are created. The design uses Treenway 7mm silk ribbon, Caron Wildflowers & Watercolours, Silk Road Straw Silk, Rainbow Gallery Entice and Petite Silk Lame Braid, Kreinik #4 braid Luminescence, Mill Hill Seed Beads and 3mm faceted Gold Iris Round beads on a 10" x 10" taped, drawn, and marked 18-count Sandstone Vintage Canvas background. The Van Dyke stitch, Peaks & Valleys, Turkey Work Variation, French Knots, the Ribbon Stitch, and bead embellishments are used to complete the design.

#### **Teacher to Provide:**

Complete thread kit with needles, 18-count Sandstone Vintage Canvas - taped with a line drawing, Instruction Booklet including a large picture of the design, stitch guide, diagrams, detail photos, Bibliography, Tips on Handling Silk Ribbon, and Sunflower Fun Facts.

#### **Student to Provide:**

- 10" x 10" Stretcher Bars for piece / tacks or staples
- Usual stitching supplies / Trolley needle and / or wooden laying tool

## *Symphony* by Barbara Kershaw

Pulled thread, Intermediate

Sewing pouch, 7½" x 6½", plus scissors case, fob, and needlebook





by Barbara Burman & Ariane Fennetaux

(Yale University Press, New Haven and London)
